



ENDLESS MOUNTAINS HERITAGE REGION

The Endless Mountains Heritage Region (EMHR) was established in 1998 as a non-profit, membership-based organization within the PA Heritage Areas Program. It is one of 12 current heritage areas across the Commonwealth, which are designated by the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR). The EMHR proudly serves a 2,850-square mile area encompassing Bradford, Sullivan, Susquehanna, and Wyoming Counties.

The organization also serves as water trail manager for the upper North Branch Susquehanna River Water Trail, a national recreation trail and official gateway to the Chesapeake Bay Gateways Network. Known for our unmatched pastoral landscapes shaped by centuries of farming and timbering as well as land conservation, the EMHR embraces its agricultural theme of "Living with the Land," and its mission to "maintain and enhance the unique rural character and culture of the Endless Mountains."

In just over 20 years of existence, the EMHR has provided financial and capacity-building support to various partner organizations and dozens of projects to fulfill that mission. Through the years, the EMHR has attained well over \$2.5 million in state funding that has been brought into the region to perform historic and agricultural preservation initiatives, outdoor recreation development and improvement projects, scenic enhancements, and heritage asset promotion. These many initiatives have undoubtedly increased the quality of life for our residents and encourage tourism across the four-county area.

EMHR serves as a regional lead organization of the Susquehanna Greenway Partnership and is involved in various greenway, land conservation, and trail initiatives in the area, as well as scenic byways and vista enhancements.

When commonwealth founder William Penn sent cartographers out to survey the lands granted to his family by King Charles II, the team came back to record a map that shows everything north of present-day Philadelphia and Bucks County as "endless mountains". Today the region we call the Endless Mountains is comprised of the four northeastern counties (Bradford, Sullivan, Susquehanna, and Wyoming) that border the Wyoming Valley to the south and New York state to the north.

STATE PARKS

The Pennsylvania Department of Conservation & Natural Resources' Bureaus of State Parks offers the following description of their work:

The primary mission of Pennsylvania state parks is to provide opportunities for enjoying healthful outdoor recreation and serve as outdoor classrooms for environmental education. In meeting these purposes, the conservation of the natural, scenic, aesthetic, and historical values of parks should be given first consideration.

The Endless Mountains are home to four of the Pennsylvania's 121 parks, each of which further that mission through resource maintenance and educational programming. At the state parks, visitors discover not only the natural beauty of the region but also enjoy for no or nominal costs activities ranging from soft to active adventure. No matter your outdoor activity of choice - hiking trails lined with spectacular waterfalls, photographing stunning vistas, sleeping under a quilt of twinkling stars, walking trails aglow with the colors of fall foliage, casting a line into a rocky mountain creek bed or snow shoeing during a gently falling

Mt. Pisgah State Park, a 1,302-acre state park at the base of Mt. Pisgah (elevation 2,260 feet), offers visitors a wide variety of recreational resources from hiking trails, spaces, and butterfly garden to a 75- acre lake complete with launch, fishing pier and boat rentals in season. Located between Troy and Towanda, the park sits along Mill Creek where a dam forms Stephen Foster Lake, named after the composer and onetime local resident. The 75-acre Stephen Foster Lake offers a boat launch, dock, restrooms, and parking area. Mooring spaces are available for rental. Adjacent to the state park are Mt. Pisgah County Park and State Game Land 289.



Educational programs as well as the summer DiscoverE program for kids are offered throughout the year at Mt. Pisgah State Park.

Ricketts Glen State Park is regarded as one of the most scenic areas in all of Pennsylvania. The park of 13,050 acres offers unsurpassed recreational resources that draw outdoors enthusiasts from far and wide. Trails ideal for every skill level of hiker are one of the park's most popular draws; the Falls Trail and the Glens feature a series of wild, free-flowing waterfalls, each cascading through rock-strewn clefts in carved by nature in the park's ancient hillsides. The 94-foot Ganoga Falls is the highest of 22 named waterfalls that visitors will discover. Ricketts Glen State Park also

harbors Glens Natural Area, a National Natural Landmark, dedicated to the preservation of old growth timber and the park's diverse wildlife population.

Lake Jean, a 245-acre recreational body of water, offers dry mooring and one boat launch (electric engines only). A boat rental concession operates during the summer season offering rowboats, paddleboats,

kayaks, and canoes while a seasonal beachfront swimming area, picnic area, pavilion and parking lot make the lake a popular vacation destination.

The park offers a wide variety of camping options for visitors to consider - ten modern rental cabins are available for year-round use as well as 120 tent and trailer campsites (some available year-round). The campground features hot showers, flush toilets, shaded sites, gravel parking spurs and a sanitary dump station. Six campsites are ADA accessible.

The 780-acre Worlds End State Park. surrounded by the lush Loyalsock State Forest, is known for its scenic vistas, dense forestation, and photographically magnificent waterways. In June, the park bursts with color when mountain laurel, Pennsylvania's state flower, blooms throughout the park. Likewise, fall foliage brings with it another seasonal display of nature's beauty when the Canyon Vista becomes ablaze with brilliant autumns colors. The hiking trails offer a wide variety of terrain for enthusiasts to experience depending upon their skill and comfort level.

Nineteen rustic cabins are available for rental throughout the year at Worlds End State park. year-round. A 70-site tent and trailer campground is located along PA 154, one mile east of the park office. Half of the campsites have electric hookups. Water and restrooms are within a short distance of all sites.

A small dam on Loyalsock Creek forms a swimming area that is open from late-May to mid-September, 8 a.m. to sunset. Swimming at the site is at your own risk. The mountain stream water is always cold and exhilarating. A picnic area, outdoor chapel, concessions area and rest facilities are all located within a short distance of the swimming area on

Old growth hemlocks, beautiful trails, and a series of scenic waterfalls along Fall Brook make the 400-acre Salt Springs State Park a popular destination for outdoor activity in Susquehanna County. Created in the 1960's on a tract of land owned by the Wheaton family from 1848, the land was purchased by The Nature Conservancy and subsequently by the commonwealth. Today, the Friends of Salt Springs State Park actively manage the educational and recreational programs that take place in the park throughout the year. From nature hikes to seasonal celebrations. outdoor enthusiasts will discover a wide variety of activities to consider when planning a visit to the park.

The Hemlock Trail features an accessible walkway that looks over the three waterfalls along Fall Brook Stream making it a popular destination for visitors. A welcome center and parking area offer easy access to the park's picnic area at the base of the mountain. A short walk across the bridge to view the area where the remains of the spring sit offers visitors a perfect spot to spend time surrounded by the natural beauty of Salt Springs State Park.

CROSS COUNTRY SKIING

ATV's are not permitted in Pennsylvania State Parks and Game Lands and permitted only in certain State Forests. Information can be found at dcnr.pa.gov . These sites offer ATV riding and dirt biking riding at certain times. Check the websites before visiting.

Sunfish Pond County Park (see page 20) in Canton, Bradford County, offers trails extending into Sullivan County specifically for snowmobile riding.

Loyalsock State Forest designates certain trails for snowmobile use each winter. Check the park website at dcnr.pa.gov for current information.

HORSEBACK RIDING

Equestrians have several spots across the region to take their horses out to enjoy the scenic trails of the Endless Mountains.

State parks and forests in Pennsylvania designate certain trails specific for horseback riding (see pages 4-6, page 10 or dcnr.org).

The D & H Rail-Trail permits horseback riding on their well maintained 38-mile trail in Susquehanna County (nepa-rail-trails.org).

STATE FORESTS



t is no wonder one of the region's most popular forests is dedicated to Gifford Pinchot, the former Pennsylvania Governor who also served as the head of the US Forestry Service. Pinchot's work in conservation and forestation are responsible in part for the commitment to keep these public lands well maintained and accessible for recreation. Tourists flock to these forests each year for the brilliant displays of Fall Foliage, while hikers, campers, sportsmen and bird watchers know these areas to be some of the best spots to connect with nature.

Loyalsock State Forest is named for the Loyalsock Creek (Pennsylvania's 2018 River of the Year), a scenic freestone stream that winds through Sullivan, Bradford, and Lycoming Counties. The predominantly hardwood forest is managed by DCNR's Bureau of Forestry to ensure the long-term health and productivity of this "working forest"; a commitment to the maintenance of the forest's wild character making it a resource for recreation, water, plant and animal habitat, sustainable timber and above all, scenic beauty.

Visitors will discover hundreds of miles of trails, toe paths and streambeds that allow access for hiking, fishing, bird watching and other outdoor activities. Primitive backpack camping is permitted while hiking along state forest trails; backpack campers are not required to obtain a camping permit if planning no more than one night at a location. Roadside campers, horse campers, and backpack campers staying in a designated campsite are required to obtain a camping permit from the Resource Management Center.

Loyalsock State Forest roads and trails are open to mountain bikes as designated by



the park rules. The variety you will discover in the forest's topography offers challenges for all skill levels.

Due to the number of boulders in the creek bed, kayaking and canoeing is recommended only in the area below Forksville. Canoes and kayaks are permitted on Bear Wallow and Sones' Pond.

Hunting is a popular use of the forest during seasons as established by the Pennsylvania Game Commission. Other than a few safety zones around buildings and picnic areas, hunting is permitted throughout the state forest. All hunters must be licensed as stipulated by Pennsylvania Game Commission and only during designated seasons.

Named in recognition of Gifford Pinchot's monumental contributions to forestry and his legacy of forest land conservation the 44,743 acres of the Pinchot State Forest lands cover more than a few of the mountains near the confluence of the Susquehanna and Lackawanna rivers. The forest encompasses lands in Wyoming County as well as other adjacent counties.

Hunting and trapping are two uses of the Pinchot State Forest that attract many visitors each year. While hiking is one of the top activities enjoyed across the forest, mountain biking in designated areas draws visitors to this scenic spot. Cyclists are encouraged to check maps for the areas they are planning to travel on their visit. Horses may be ridden on state forest roads and



most trails. For rules, regulations, and trail maps, visit the website.


Mountain bikes may be used on most roads and trails in Pinchot State Forest, unless posted. The snowmobile trail is open to mountain biking; the degree of riding difficulty varies across the forest district. Bicyclists are encouraged to check maps for the areas they are planning to travel on their visit.

Horses may be ridden on all state forest roads and most trails on the Pinchot State Forest, including the Snowmobile Trail. Horseback riders should use caution when riding on the Pinchot State Forest as other users, including mountain bikers, hikers, hunters, and fishermen may be nearby.

Bradford County

The 1,100 square miles of land featuring some of Pennsylvania's richest farmlands, sprawling parks, sparkling waterways and charming small towns make Bradford County an outdoor lover's dream destination. The Susquehanna River flowing through the county offers many miles of recreational waters for fishing, canoeing, and kayaking. Parks and pavilions throughout the county host outdoor events large and small throughout the year that make Bradford County a popular destination for sportsmen and families alike.

Originally called Ontario County, in 1812 the county officially became Bradford County to honor former US Attorney General William Bradford who was instrumental in the formation. Today, campers, hikers, bicyclists, anglers, and hunters enjoy the rich outdoor inventory of activities when they plan a visit to the county bearing his name.



WATERWAYS & WATERFALLS



Whether you are looking for the thrill of canoeing the currents or casting off on a pastoral shore for a lazy day of fishing, the lakes, rivers, creeks and other bodies of waters across the Endless Mountains have a perfect location to fill your recreational needs all four seasons of the year!

WATER TRAILS

Susquehanna River North Branch Water Trail

The Endless Mountains Heritage Region proudly serves as the official Water Trail Management organization for the upper North Branch Susquehanna River Water Trail (NBSRWT). The North Branch has been designated as a National Recreation Trail of the National Park Service since 2009 and is also part of the Pennsylvania Water Trail System coordinated by the Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission. This recreational trail offers kayakers, canoers, and paddlers some of the most scenic waters in the mid-Atlantic to discover and explore. emheritage.org

RIVERS & CREEKS

Susquehanna River

From the tributaries in New York state to the Chesapeake watershed into which it empties, the mighty Susquehanna River has a rich history as a recreational and commercial artery linking towns and regions across the mid-Atlantic. Meandering through Susquehanna, Bradford, and Wyoming Counties, thanks to the efforts of conservationists and ecologists, visitors will discover almost 100 miles of clean, clear water for recreation. Boating, kayaking, canoeing, fishing, and tubing are some of the activities that visitors will enjoy along this beautiful waterway – Pennsylvania's 2016 River of the Year!

Chemung River

Tributary of the Susquehanna River where it crosses into Pennsylvania from New York State, visitors will discover a boat launch and recreational resources near Sayre.

Loyalsock Creek

A trout fishing fan's dream come true! Meandering along 64 miles of scenic wilderness, this popular creek was named 2018's Pennsylvania River of the Year in honor of the wide variety of recreational activities visitors will discover. From the swimming area at Worlds End State Park to the rocky streambed filled with freshwater fish besides trout, Loyalsock Creek is a "must visit" for outdoor enthusiasts in Northeastern Pennsylvania!

Bowman Creek

This 6-mile creek running along State Route 292 to Eatonville is highlighted by natural pools and easy rapids.

Meshoppen Creek

This challenging 7-mile creek runs from Kaiserville to Meshoppen surrounded by a scenic course in Wyoming County.

South Branch Tunkhannock Creek

Running from Factoryville to Dixon in Wyoming County, this 7-mile creek is one of the region's most popular whitewater runs due to the rapids it offers.

Tunkhannock Creek

The 42-mile Tunkhannock Creek, a tributary of the Susquehanna River, runs along Route 29 through parts of Wyoming and Susquehanna counties. The creek is one of the sites used by Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission as part of their Keystone Select Stocked Trout Waters Program making it a great destination for fishing in the region.

Lower Mehoopany Creek

The 6-mile course of this creek running from Forkston to Mehoopany offers easier rapids for navigation as it winds through this stretch of Wyoming County.

Mehoopany Creek

Scenic spot in Wyoming County highlighted by numerous rapids along a 6 mile stretch form Stony Brook to Forkston.

Upper Mehoopany Creek

This Wyoming County Creek is one of the Endless Mountains' best whitewater runs featuring challenging rapids and waterfalls. Recommended for experienced paddlers.

LAKES & PONDS

Lake Carey

The land surrounding this 182-acre lake is privately owned but this natural lake in Wyoming County is accessible to the public for recreational use.

Lake Winola

These 185 acres in Wyoming County are composed of an eastern and western basin, separated by a peninsula entering the lake from north to south. The lake is managed by the Pennsylvania Fish and Boat Commission. A public boat launch is located along the southeast corner of the lake. Motorized boats are permitted on the lake but are required to navigate counterclockwise.

Fiddle Lake / Fiddle Lake Creek

Starting at site of the lake, the creek is a tributary of the West Branch of the Lackawanna River running through Susquehanna County. The creek runs approximately 6 miles flowing though Ararat Township, Herrick Township, and Union Dale.

Eagles Mere Lake

A private lake that is not open to the public, those looking for an outdoor getaway can seek access through lodging partners and vacation rentals offered by realtors in the region who work in agreement with the lake association. The Eagles Mere Conservancy in town offers outdoor recreation programs that are open to the public.

Forest Lake

Reservoir located just 5.7 miles from Montrose, in Susquehanna County where fishing enthusiasts will find a variety of fish including perch, rainbow trout, bream/bluegill and largemouth bass.

Heart Lake

Lake in Susquehanna County also known as "Hart Lake". Fishing during season with current Pennsylvania license.

Hunters Lake

This freshwater lake in Shrewsbury, Sullivan County, s a 117-acre impoundment owned by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and managed by the Fish and Boat Commission for public fishing and boating. The property, which includes approximately 2,000 acres of surrounding woodlands, allows only electric and non-electric engines on craft.

Lake Jean

Part of Ricketts Glen State Park, Lake Jean offers a wide variety of activities from boating and kayaking to fishing to swimming. Boat rentals are available in season and the beach front and pavilion offer other recreational opportunities for visitors at this pristine, fresh mountain water lake.



Lake Montrose

Reservoir outside Montrose, Susquehanna County, where pickerel, large and small mouthed bass and other local varieties can be found. Scenic spot to spend a day in the mountains casting off.

Lake Wesauking

Located approximately four miles from Towanda in Bradford County, this picturesque fishing area is a favorite in season as a scenic spot to cast off on a beautiful day.

Oxbow Lake

Boats are not permitted on this 60 acre lake in Wyoming County; fishing is permitted from the shore only.

Quaker Lake

This 122-acre lake in Susquehanna County is a favorite spot for anglers looking to catch a variety of fish including Rainbow Trout.

Shumans Lake

Sixty-acre lake in Sullivan County near State Game Lands 66, not far from Lopez.

Bayards Pond

Reservoir located just 7miles from Athens, in Bradford County, that plays home to a wide variety of fish along Pennsylvania's northern tier.

Bearwallow Pond

Twenty-three-acre pond in Sullivan County offering beautiful scenery and a peaceful setting for a day on the water.

Claverack Pond

Reservoir in Bradford County near the Susquehanna River and Route 6; easy access.

Shores Pond

Near Wysox in Bradford County, this 17-acre pond is a favorite of local fisherman. Easily accessible right off PA Route 6.

Sones Pond

Sitting in the heart of the Loyalsock Forest, this fishing area offers restrooms, picnic facilities, and a public boat access.

Splashdam Pond

55-acre pond in Colley Township, Sullivan County, regarded as an excellent spot for bird watching and fishing.



Ricketts Glen State Park

The Glen Natural Area along the Falls Trail System of the Park offer hikers 21 waterfalls along the 3.2-mile hiking loop. This spectacular natural display is easily accessed from parking areas along PE Route 118 and from the Lake Jean parking areas.

Salt Springs State Park

Visitors will discover three waterfalls in the scenic rocky gorge of the 405-acre park along the Fall Brook in this beautiful forest known for its old growth hemlock trees.

Loyalsock Forest

Dry Run Falls

Close to parking and picnic areas in Loyalsock State Forest, Sullivan County, this 20-foot, two streamed waterfalls is easily accessible for visitors to enjoy.

Dutchman Falls

A short hike along the Loyalsock Trail in Sullivan County leads to this two-tier waterfall that naturally forms on the Loyalsock Creek.

Big Run Falls

A trio of roadside waterfalls in Sullivan County, easily accessible from Sullivan Falls Road.

Boat Launches/Permits

Permits are required for boats in Pennsylvania whether for fishing or recreational paddling.

The Resources page (page 30) lists all of websites where a boater can read the rules as well as apply for temporary and permanent permits. Local outfitters can also assist with purchasing stickers.

These resources also offer the updated launch sites for the county you are visiting. Remember, violators of the rules can face fines.

WATERFALLS

One of the things that characterize the Endless Mountains waterways and trails is the abundance of natural waterfalls that outdoor enthusiasts will discovering the region. Some of the area's most photographic natural settings surround these waterfalls that visitors will find across Northeastern Pennsylvania!

Buttermilk Falls

Located near the road along PA Route 92 and Falls Road in Wyoming County. Note: Parking may be difficult at the site; best view of the falls is from a boat in the Susquehanna River.

Double Run Falls

Located along the two-mile Double Run Hiking Trail in Forksville, Sullivan County.

Dutchman Falls

Located near the head of the Loyalsock Trail in Sullivan County, this 25-foot waterfall is located along a path for moderate accessibility.

Falls Creek Trail

A series of waterfalls located along Falls Creek in State Game Lands 12, Franklin Twp., Bradford County.

Mineral Spring and Neeneha Falls



THE D&H Rail-Trail

Today, the D & H Rail-Trail uses that historic 38-mile section to offer recreational users one of the region's premiere resources. Running through the small towns of Forest City, Union Dale, Herrick Center, Burnwood, Ararat, Thompson, Starrucca, Stevens Point, and Lanesboro, the trail offers hikers, bicyclists, runners, cross country skiers and horseback riders a well-maintained course that offers beautiful scenery along the way.

ATVs and dirt bikes are not permitted on the trail while snowmobiles require a trail pass for use. (More information at www. nepsnotrails.snowclubs.com). The trail is open for public use each day from dawn to dusk, closed at sunset. Permission is required to be on or along the trail after dark for hikers and other recreational users. The trail is approximately 80 feet wide in most places, users are asked to stay on the trail as much of the adjoining acreage is private property. Portable rest stations are maintained along the trail at the Forest City and Union Dale trailheads from May through November.

The D & H Rail-Trail offers plenty of opportunities to spend time pursuing your favorite activities while enjoying the beauty of the four seasons in this region. A walk along the trail during autumn is one of the best ways to celebrate Fall Foliage in the Endless Mountains. The D & H Rail-Trail offers visitors a destination to enjoy recreational activities, discover a part of local history, as well as an opportunity to visit some of the small towns connected by this wonderful resource.



BIRD WATCHING



A pair of binoculars, camera and patience are all you need to get you started on one of the outdoors fastest growing past times – bird watching.

Bird watching is a marvelous way to enjoy the outdoors, and the Endless Mountains offer countless locations to observe both native and migratory species throughout the year. In addition to the forests and mountains where game birds, hawks and eagles can be discovered, water adjacent wetlands across all four counties play home to waterfowl and songbirds. According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, about 50 million Americans are avid bird watchers, many of whom are tourists who travel to different places to observe the native species of a particular region.

The variety of birds you will discover in the Endless Mountains is a large one – from robins and sparrows to brown hawks and eagles. The Northeast Pennsylvania Audubon Chapter website offers a comprehensive listing of birds' native to the area – Northeast PA Audubon Bird Identification Page. Local organizations like the Friends of Salt Springs State Park and the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources offer educational programs throughout the year, as do local conservancies.

When looking to plan your outdoor adventure to the Endless Mountains, the Endless Mountains Heritage Region, Endless Mountains Visitors Bureau and Bradford County Tourism Promotion Agency are full-service visitor information bureaus whose mission is to assist visitors and travel planners. Though the mountains and waterways of the Endless Mountains are unsurpassed for their scenic beauty, like all expansive outdoor regions certain precautions and tips bear consideration to make sure your visit is as safe and as worry-free as possible.

COVID-19

As this Outdoor Recreation Guide is being prepared for publication in late 2020, the past year has seen the unprecedented outbreak of the COVID-19 affect the way we navigated not only our region, but our contact with the entire world. Moving forward, vaccines and other measures are steps are being implemented that will help us mitigate the spread of this virus. Points to consider when planning your visit include:

- Staying up to date on recommendations as set forth by the Pennsylvania Department of Health as you plan your visit and staying up to date while in the region. You can access the current guidelines and recommendations at the website www.health.pa.gov or by calling 1-877-PA HEALTH.
- Wear cloth masks; maintain social distancing protocols where necessary.
- •Wash hands frequently with hot soapy water for at least 20 seconds; If soap and water are not readily available, you can use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60 percent alcohol.
- Comply with lodging, campground, and rental property rules and guidelines as directed.

TICKS & TICK-BORNE ILLNESS


The Pennsylvania deer population as well as other wildlife carry with them ticks, the insects who transmit and spread the debilitating Lyme Disease that has been on the rise over the last two decades. Some simple precautions when spending time in wooded or grassy regions will ensure you can avid any possible exposure:

- Treat clothing and gear with products containing 0.5% permethrin. Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus (OLE), para-menthane-diol (PMD) or 2-undecanone.
- Check clothing, gear, and pets for ticks after going indoors. Helpful Tip: Run a lint roller over clothing after being in woods and grasses.
- Shower within 2 hours of being outdoors making sure to check your entire body for ticks and immediately remove any that you find. Tips for removing a tick can be found on the Department of Health website health.pa.gov.

WEATHER

Northeastern Pennsylvania's location directly south of the Great Lakes air currents and due west of the Atlantic Ocean's Gulf Stream, mean that at various times of the year, atmospheric conditions allow for rapid changes to the seasonal weather patterns. Winter can bring unexpected squalls and sleets making for treacherous driving, while summer storms and spring rains can produce damaging winds and lightning. A few recommendations are offered to keep you one step ahead of sudden changes:

- Before heading out for a day of activity, check the current conditions being broadcast by local media and weather reporting agencies. Apps like The Weather Channel, The National Weather Service and the local Eyewitess News Weather Alert app that covers all four counties of the Endless Mountains offer up to the minute changes and alerts.
- Look for stone formations and safe structures along trails and byways as conditions begin changing. Do not seek shelter under a tree in a thunderstorm but opt instead for low to the ground shelters and overhangs to allow the danger to pass.
- Plan for changes in the weather when packing. Nights can grow colder in the mountains in spring and summer when conditions permit; pack a jacket or sweatshirt even in warm weather.
